PROJECT ON AGING PROPOSED ALLOCATION OF FY 2015 HOME AND COMMUNITY CARE BLOCK GRANT (H&CCBG) FUNDS

Ms. Angie Boitnotte presented the projected allocation of \$256,063 in Home and Community Care Block Grant (H&CCBG) funds for FY 2015. The required local match, in the amount of \$28,452, was present in the Project on Aging's FY 2015 requested budget. Ms. Boitnotte stated that the Home and Community Care Block Grant (H&CCBG) Committee recommended the funds be allocated as follows:

MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

A. Request for Use of Old High School Parking Lot

County Manager Geouque stated that Mr. Scott Nelson, President of Blood, Sweat, and Gears (BSG), had requested use of the Old Watauga High School parking lot for the purpose of a fireworks show on June 28, 2014. The firework display was in conjunction with the BSG event in Valle Crucis. The fireworks were in honor of 18 paraplegic military veterans participating in the event and all of the veterans and their sacrifices. The County Manager stated that BSG would be required to obtain all necessary and required permits for the event.

Mr. Sean Spiegelman, owner of Mountain Brewery, stated that the Brewery was sponsoring the paraplegic veterans in the event and will host the event in their honor to view the fireworks display. Mr. Spiegelman stated that only the fireworks team would be present at the Old Watauga High School site as those viewing the fireworks show would be at the Brewery. Mr. Spiegelman stated that proper insurance would be provided.

Commissioner Yates, seconded by Commissioner Welch, moved to allow Blood, Sweat, and Gears to utilize the Old Watauga High School parking lot for a fireworks display contingent upon Blood, Sweat, and Gears working with the County Attorney to ensure that insurance was in place to protect the County from liability.

Executive Summary

The Watauga County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, has completed the activities required to develop this County Plan for FY 2014-2015 through FY 2015-2016.

The JCPC has identified the issues and factors which have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in Watauga County. Further, the JCPC has identified the strategies and services most likely to reduce/prevent delinquent behavior.

Priorities for Funding: Through a risk & needs assessment and a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce/prevent delinquency in Watauga County.

1. Parent Education and Skill Building
2. Interpersonal Skill Building
3. Mediation
4. Community Service/Restitution
5. Group Home
6. Temporary Shelter Care

Monitoring and Evaluation: Each program funded in the past year by the JCPC has been monitored. The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions. The JCPC continues to conduct implementation monitoring of its action plan and its funded programs on a quarterly basis.

Funding Recommendations: Having published a Request for Proposals for these needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, the JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and has determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services. As required by statute, the JCPC recommends allocation of the NC Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (NC DJJDP) Funds to the following Programs in the amounts specified below for FY 2014-2015 (See JCPC Funding Allocations page) :



JCPC PROGRAMS

- 1. Mediation and Restorative Justice Center** – The Juvenile Mediation Program provides mediation services to juveniles to resolve problems such as 1) truancy, 2) school fights, rumors and other person crimes, 3) vandalism, theft, and other property crimes, 4) undisciplined behavior, and 5) family conflict and disruption. The program also accepts referrals for dispute resolution skill-building classes to teach conflict resolution, communication and other skills.
- 2. Project Challenge** – provides a dispositional option to juvenile court allowing participants to repay or give back to their community. Project Challenge provides participants the opportunity to fulfill their obligation to the courts by completing community service, and provides victims repayment of monetary loss. The mission of Project Challenge is to help youth become confident, productive members of their community through the offering of their time and talents and through challenging recreational activities.
- 3. Crossnore School** – provides a temporary shelter in a residential education setting to include 24-hour care and supervision of juveniles by Resident Counselors and Case Management services provided by Case Managers while addressing the issues which resulted in the juvenile being placed at The Crossnore School. Counseling services, access to medical attention at Crossnore Clinic and/or local doctor's office and educational opportunities at Crossnore Academy are also available, offered and provided through other funding sources.
- 4. Western Youth Network, "WYN"** – WYN's Youth Resource Center Program is a Tutoring/Academic Enhancement Program for adjudicated and/or high-risk middle school youth. The program operates from 2:30 – 5:30pm, Monday – Friday throughout the school year and for five (5) weeks during the summer. WYN YRC staff provide daily transportation from participants' schools and to their homes each evening. The WYN YRC program also provides a Supplemental Service, mentoring, that matches a well-trained positive adult role model with participating youth for two hours per week for one calendar year.

Part I Risk

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Risk Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors after juveniles are referred with a complaint alleging that a delinquent act has occurred and prior to adjudication of the juvenile. The Juvenile Risk Assessment is an instrument used to predict the likelihood of the juvenile being involved in future delinquent behavior. For some youth, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (*represented by percentages which have a star next to them*), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

General Observations

- The number of detention admissions has dropped steadily over the 4 year period to a low of 5 admissions in 2012-13 compared to a high of 24 in 2009-10.
- The number of short term out of school suspensions has increased to a high of 296 in 2012-13.

Watauga County Risk Factor Observations: FY 2012-2013

- R1 Age of First Delinquent Offense – Over the 4 year period 9 to 14% of youth were under the age of 12 upon their first delinquent offense. The percentage was roughly the same as the state.
- R4 Prior Assaults – The categories of prior affray and prior assault without a weapon were not elevated compared to the state. With 12% of court involved youth involved in affray compared to the state at 4% and 18% with a prior assault without a weapon compared to the state at 12%.
- R6 Known Use of Alcohol, Illegal Drugs – Percent of youth with substance abuse/use risk is higher than the state. For the 4 years percentages are: 53%, 59%, 45%, and 36%. The state average was at 30%.
- R7 School Behavior Problems – The minor and moderate school behavior problems were elevated at 17% and 30% with 86% experiencing minor, moderate or serious school behavior problems. These have moderated over the past year but have been high for the 4 year period.
- R8 Relationship with Peers – Youth who lack pro social peers and associate with delinquent peers remains high over the 4 year period, from 84% in 2009-10, 73%, 73% and 72% in 2012-13. The percent of youth who are gang involved has ranged between 2-3%.
- R9 Parental Supervision – The number of parents willing but unable to supervise is higher than the state (at 44%, 52%, 44% and 38% respectively over the 4 years). There is a good decline over the period, however it remains higher than the state at 21%.

Part II. Needs

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee also reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Needs Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors prior to court disposition of a juvenile. The Juvenile Needs Assessment is an instrument used to examine a youth's needs in the various domains of his life: The Individual Domain, The School Domain, The Peer Domain, and the Community Domain. This instrument was designed to detect service intervention needs as an aid in service planning. As with the Juvenile Risk Assessment, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (*represented by percentages which have a star next to them*), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

Watauga County Elevated Needs Observations: FY 2012-2013

- Percent of youth with medium and high needs remains higher than the statewide percentages (Medium-51% and High-10% in 2012-13).
- Y1 Peer Relationships – Court involved youth who sometimes or regularly associated with delinquent peers was 65% in 2009-10 and 54%, 58%, and 48% in the subsequent years. This is compared with an average 47% for the State.
- Y2 School Behavior – 77% (State = 68%) of court involved youth in 2012-13 had moderate to serious school behavior problems, higher than past years at 62% and 53%.
- Y4 Substance Abuse – 41% of youth had substance abuse problems in 2012-13, compared to 30% in the State. The three prior fiscal years showed substance abuse problems at 60%, 61% and 46%.
- Y6 Abuse/Neglect History – 41% of court involved youth were victims of abuse or neglect in 2012-13 compared to the state at 19%. Prior years showed 37% 44%, and 42%.
- Y8 Mental Health Needs – 87% of youth have some mental health problem in 2012-13. This is higher than the state percent at 66%. Suspect this is higher due to JJTC assessing all youth for mental health problems.
- Y10 Health and Hygiene – 28% of youth had a health/hygiene problem in 2012-13, this has decreased over the 4 year period from 38%. This is largely due to use of tobacco products.
- F1 Conflict in the Home – Domestic discord remains higher than the state over the 4 year data period (52% 45%, 38% and 38% compared to the state at 19%, 19% 18% and 18%). Youth experiencing domestic violence was 10% in 2012-13 compared to the State at 6%.
- F2 Family Supervision Skills – Families with marginal supervision skill over the past 3 years was 73%, 76% 71% and 73% compared to the State at 52%, 51%, 51% and 51%
- F4 Family Substance Abuse – Family abuse of substances in 2012-13 was 26% of families and was as high as 33% in 2009-10. This is compared to the state average of 10%.
- F5 Family Criminality – 42% of families either have family criminal history or have a family member on active court supervision or are gang involved. This is in comparison to the state average at 38%.

Part IV. Summary of Gaps and Barriers in the Continuum of Services

Services that do not exist and are needed are:

- Teen Center - A center was noted as a need in the gang assessment report. Funding is not available at this time.
- Community Day Programming - Services needed are structured day and alternative settings to school suspensions.
- Transportation – At risk youth need to be able to access resources.
- Parenting resources – Education is needed for parents (special emphasis for teenage parents) and domestic violence prevention.
- Pro-social resources - After school activities are needed in the community and transportation is needed to be able to access such resources.
- Language – Communication is a barrier to using resources. Additional Hispanic and language resources are needed including Hispanic parent and child support groups.
- Independent living programming
- Respite care

Part V. Proposed Priority Services for Funding

The committee compared the services needed to address the elevated Juvenile Risk Factors and Juvenile Needs with services currently available in the community. Services which are currently available in the community and sufficient to meet the needs of court involved youth or those youth most at risk for court involvement are not considered as a priority for JCPC funding.

The JCPC proposes that the following services be approved as the funding priorities for FY 2014-2015:

- Parent Education & Skill Building
- Interpersonal Skill Building
- Mediation
- Community Service/Restitution
- Group Home
- Temporary Shelter Care

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Mr. Joe Furman, Planning and Inspections Director, will present proposed amendments to two County ordinances as recommended by the Planning Board. The first amendment is to the Ordinance To Govern Subdivisions and Multi Unit Structures. The Planning Board is requesting to add Subsection 71.0233 which would provide a mechanism for developers that had preliminary plats approved with 18 foot wide roads and began construction prior to the new 20 foot requirement to receive plat approval, without requesting a variance, if they meet the requirements of the new Subsection. In May, 2012, the ordinance was amended to increase the required road width from 18 to 20 feet in order to be consistent with the NC Fire Code. The proposal is attached.

The second amendment is to the Sign Ordinance. New electronic billboards are prohibited under the ordinance, however on-premise electronic variable message signs for businesses, churches, etc. are allowed. The Planning Board is requesting to change the time the message must remained fixed from one (1) hour to fifteen (15) seconds. The proposal is also attached.

The Board may wish to schedule a public hearing, work session, or joint meeting with the Planning Board. A public hearing is required prior to the adoption of the ordinance changes.

Staff seeks direction from the Board.

The Planning Board is proposing minor amendments to two County ordinances as follows.

Ordinance To Govern Subdivisions And Multi Unit Structures: In May, 2012, the ordinance was amended to increase the required road width from 18 to 20 feet in order to be consistent with the NC Fire Code. Recently, we have discovered several instances of subdivisions that received preliminary plat approval prior to the recession that had 18 foot wide roads constructed, but due to the economy never returned for final plat approval. The preliminary plats have long since expired, meaning the 20 foot requirement would be applicable when the developers seek preliminary plat renewal. It is impractical to require the additional two feet of roadway; relief can be provided through granting of a variance, which because of NC Statute changes is now a more complicated and expensive process than was previously needed for this ordinance. Accordingly, the Planning Board is proposing an amendment that will provide for the needed relief without going through the variance process. The proposal is attached.

Sign Ordinance: The sign ordinance does not allow new electronic billboards but does allow on-premise electronic variable message signs for businesses, churches, etc. Section C. 2. of the ordinance sets forth the regulations for such signs. Subsection b. provides that the sign's message must remain in a fixed position for 1 hour before changing. The Planning Board has been considering that provision and believes it is unreasonably long. Unfortunately, standards for such signs statewide and nationwide vary dramatically so there is no consistent standard to embrace. The national standard for highway billboards is that messages can change every 8 seconds; there is no national standard for these smaller on-premise variable message signs. In NC, standards for these types of signs range from allowing changes every 8 seconds to 8 times daily. After much consideration, the Planning Board is suggesting a 15 second change interval. That proposal is also attached.

Should the Commissioners desire to consider these proposals, a public hearing is necessary prior to adoption.

Proposed Amendment to Ordinance To Govern Subdivisions and Multi-Unit Structures

Add new subsection 71.0233 as follows.

71.0233 In the case of roads which were approved and for which construction began prior to the adoption of the 20-foot width requirement on May 15, 2012, the Planning Board may allow 18-foot road width provided the Board determines the following.

- a) the subject road received a preliminary plat approval prior to May 15, 2012, and
- b) the road was substantially completed to the formerly-required 18-foot width, and
- c) it is impractical from an engineering or environmental perspective to increase the width to 20 feet. Examples include, but are not limited to: 1) underground utilities have been placed in the road right-of-way, 2) cut and fill slopes have been stabilized and additional grading would unnecessarily affect the slopes, 3) the subject road segment is the final segment of an existing road.

C. Prohibited Signs.

1. Signs that are structurally unsafe and thereby endanger the public safety shall be removed unless they are repaired and made to comply with the requirements of the North Carolina State Building Code.
2. Flashing and moving signs are prohibited. A sign provided as a public service showing the time and temperature shall not be considered a flashing sign. Changeable electronic variable message signs are not considered flashing and moving provided the signs comply with the following provisions:
 - a. The sign does not contain or display flashing, intermittent, or moving lights, including animated or scrolling advertising;
 - b. The sign facing remains in a fixed position for at least ~~one (1) hour~~ **fifteen (15) seconds** (for on-premise signs);
 - c. If a message is changed electronically, it must be accomplished within an interval of two (2) seconds or less;
 - d. The sign must contain a default design that will freeze the sign in one position if a malfunction occurs;
 - e. A changeable electronic variable message sign shall be equipped with a control system that automatically adjusts light emission level to ambient light conditions so as to not cause glare or excessive brightness. In no case shall the light level of any such sign exceed 300 nits (candelas per square meter) between the time of sunset and sunrise, nor 5,000 nits at other times. No more than 25% of the sign message may be white. Notwithstanding the acceptable light levels, internal illumination shall not be at an intensity that is distracting to vehicular traffic; and
 - f. Subsequent to installation, Watauga County shall have the ongoing discretion to require that brightness, frequency, colors or other qualities be adjusted in order to address safety concerns.
3. Advertising and business signs that are tacked, nailed, posted, pasted, painted, glued, or otherwise attached to trees or rocks.
4. No source of illumination on a sign, such as floodlights, spotlights, unshielded bulbs, etc. shall shine directly into any public right-of-way. Internal illumination shall not be at an intensity that is distracting to vehicular traffic.

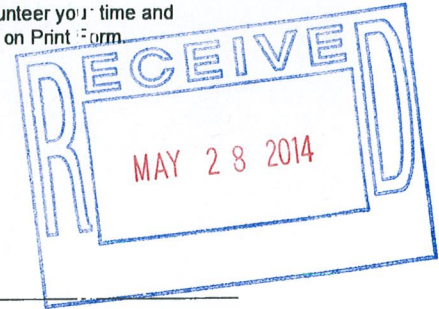


