WATAUGA COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TUESDAY, JUNE 18, 2013

The Watauga County Board of Commissioners held a regular meeting on Tuesday, June 18, 2013, at 5:30 P.M. in the Commissioners' Board Room of the Watauga County Administration Building, Boone, North Carolina.

PRESENT: Nathan Miller, Chairman David Blust, Vice-Chairman Billy Kennedy, Commissioner John Welch, Commissioner Perry Yates, Commissioner Stacy Eggers, IV, County Attorney Deron Geouque, County Manager Anita J. Fogle, Clerk to the Board

Chairman Miller called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M.

Vice-Chairman Blust opened the meeting with a prayer and Commissioner Yates led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chairman Miller called for additions and/or corrections to the May 9 and 13, 2013, special meeting minutes and June 4, 2013, regular meeting and closed session minutes.

PROJECT ON AGING MATTERS

A. Proposed Allocation of Estimated FY 2014 Home and Community Care Block Grant (H&CCBG) Funds

Ms. Angie Boitnotte recommended accepting \$253,085 in Home and Community Care Block Grant (H&CCBG) funds for FY 2014. The required local match was \$28,121 and was present in the Project on Aging's FY 2014 budget.

H&CCBG funding was proposed to be allocated as follows:

Ms. Boitnotte stated that Title III-D funds were required to be used for Evidence Based Health Promotion (EBHP) classes for FY 2014 and those funds were to remain at the High County Area Agency on Aging to support EBHP programs across their seven-county region. Ms. Boitnotte stated that Family Caregiver Support Program funds (Respite II) would also remain at the High Country Area Agency on Aging level. Commissioner Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Yates, moved to approve the allocations of Home and Community Care Block Grant funds as presented by Ms. Boitnotte.

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B. FY 2014 AppalCART Contract

FY 2014 APPALCART CONTRACTS FOR PARKS AND RECREATION AND SOCIAL SERVICES

County Manager Geouque presented proposed transportation contracts with AppalCART for services in FY 2014 for the Departments of Parks and Recreation and Social Services. The proposed rates are the same as the current fiscal year at: \$1.25 per vehicle mile and \$14.68 per vehicle service hour for Parks and Recreation and \$1.40 per vehicle mile for Social Services.

Commissioner Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Welch, moved to approve transportation contracts with AppalCART with the Department of Parks and Recreation and Social Services as presented.

MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

A. Request to Close Container Site on US Highway 221 South

County Manager Geouque stated that Mr. Keith Ebert had requested the Board close the container site located on US Highway 221 South. Mr. Ebert owns property and a home adjacent to the site. He would like the facility closed for several reasons: 1) the attraction of vermin and bears; 2) site location is not optimal as it is in a blind curve; and 3) designation of the Highway as a "scenic highway."

The County Manager stated that the County was currently in the seventh (7th) year of a twenty (20) year lease on the property. As there was no termination clause in the lease, the County would be responsible for the remaining thirteen (13) years of the lease at a cost of \$35,700. Annual cost to operate the site is \$59,685. Sanitation staff is unaware of any other complaints regarding the site. In addition, staff has made several accommodations to ease Mr. Ebert's concerns. Currently no recyclables are thrown into the dumpsters until after 10:00 A.M. and the trash truck is not dispatched for pick up until 12:00 P.M. or 1:00 P.M. unless required. These measures were developed by staff with the assistance of Mr. Ebert to reduce the noise level at the site.

The County Manager stated the following three options: 1) continue operating the site as/is with the measures currently in place; 2) close the site; or 3) relocate the site.

By consensus, the Board agreed to continue operations at the site with the measures currently in place.

B. Proposed Policy to Provide Preference to Local Vendors in Purchasing of Equipment and Supplies

County Manager Geouque stated that, per Commissioner request and discussion at the annual retreat, staff drafted a policy to provide a preference to local vendors in the purchasing of equipment and supplies. The policy would cover services and goods not covered by North Carolina General Statutes. The preference would allow a qualified County resident bidder to

match the price and terms of the lowest responsible nonresident bidder, if the County resident bidder's price was within five percent (5%) or \$10,000, whichever is less, of the nonresident bidder's price. If the resident bidder requests and qualifies for the price-matching preference, the resident bidder would first be offered the contract award and would have two (2) business days to accept or decline the award based on the lowest responsible nonresident bidder's price.

The County Manager presented a draft resolution which would need to be adopted to approve the policy. Current legislation was being considered at the state level to provide the same local preference to counties statewide. The Board may wish to wait for the North Carolina General Assembly to adjourn before adopting a County policy.

Commissioner Yates, seconded by Commissioner Welch, moved to adopt the resolution approving the Policy to Provide Preference to Local Vendors in Purchasing of Equipment and Supplies as presented.

C. Proposed Policy for Naming County Facilities

County Manager Geouque stated that, per Commissioner request and discussion at the annual retreat, staff drafted a policy to provide for the naming of County facilities, property, and space. The Watauga County Library had requested approval by the Board to name a meeting room in the Library in honor of Ms. Evelyn Johnson.

Commissioner Kennedy, seconded by Vice-Chairman Blust, moved to approve the Policy for Naming County Facilities as presented.

D. Debt Service Plan

County Manager Geouque stated that, based on previous discussions with the Board, it was staff's understanding to reduce County debt when opportunities arose. Due to the refinancing of the high school loan, the County realized a cost savings of \$329,113. As the refinancing was not completed prior to the adoption of the Fiscal Year 2012-2013 budget, staff was required to budget the full amount. Three options were available for the utilization of the savings: 1) Pay the funds on the Series B loan which would result in an estimated savings of \$11,900 and close the funding gap created by the previous Board's allocation of \$360,630 of the \$6 million debt service plan to the School Board. The remaining short fall would be \$19,617.; 2) Reduce the budgeted transfer to the Debt Service Fund from the General Fund in the current Fiscal Year 2012-2013 budget; 3) Transfer the funds to the Capital Projects Fund to be used as part of the Debt Service set aside plan for FY 2014-2015; or 4) Utilize the funds for Capital Improvement Projects.

The County Manager stated that staff recommended option one (1) as it would reduce the impact on the County's debt and also assist the County in meeting its debt service plan.

Commissioner Yates, seconded by Commissioner Welch, moved to approve option one (pay the funds on the Series B loan) as presented.

E. Boards & Commissions

County Manager Geouque stated that the Voluntary Farmland Preservation Program Advisory Board recently nominated Ms. Jennifer Miller for an appointment to their Board.

Commissioner Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Welch, moved to appoint Ms. Jennifer Miller to the Voluntary Farmland Preservation Program Advisory Board as recommended.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

County Manager Geouque stated that Mr. Frank Bolick and Mr. Dale Greene had submitted applications for appointment to the Town of Boone Planning Commission and Board of Adjustment, respectively. In addition, Mr. Wayne Green sent an email requesting consideration for appointment to either of the Town Boards. The Town of Boone supplied a list of vacancies in March and was unable to provide an updated list prior to the Board packet completion. All three names have been submitted to the Town of Boone for consideration. The Town Clerk sent an email stating the Council has deferred making nominations for appointment to ETJ positions for the past couple of months in order to allow for the receipt of additional applications. The Council would be considering board appointments at their June 20th regular meeting. Based on the list provided in March, it would appear there are four (4) vacancies for the Board of Adjustment and two (2) vacancies for the Planning Commission. Below is a listing of these vacancies.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Mr. Jeff Virginia, Emergency Services Director, will present renewals for the Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and paging software contracts with Southern Software. The cost of the CAD contract is \$8,668 and \$758 for the paging software contract. The contracts are necessary for the operation of the County's E911 system. Adequate funds have been budgeted in the current fiscal year to cover the \$9,426 renewal costs.

Board action is required to approve the contracts with Southern Software in the amount of \$8,668 and \$758, respectively.

SOUTHERN SOFTWARE'S ANNUAL SOFTWARE SUPPORT AGREEMENT CAD™ 24/7

Southern Software's CAD[™] Computer Aided Dispatch. This Software Support Agreement covers 24 hours a day, seven days a week support.

Problem Resolution

Southern Software will provide customer software support for mission critical operation of **CAD**TM, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This period includes holidays and weekends. This Agreement does not constitute a warranty but provides for mission critical problem resolutions at any time and non-mission critical problem resolutions of repeatable errors during normal business hours, EST. Southern Software cannot warrant the product will operate free of problems in perpetuity. Southern Software does not warrant third party software applications used in programs provided to customers, i.e., Microsoft® Word. The purpose of this Agreement is to provide the necessary technical assistance to ensure a timely problem resolution and to minimize down time. This Agreement is not intended to provide around-the-clock assistance for problems not deemed to be operation critical. Mission critical is defined as "any problem that renders the entire system unstable or inoperable".

For problems covered under this Agreement, Southern Software will provide the following:

- Telephone response within three hours of notification of the problem from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., EST, Monday thru Friday. During this initial response, support personnel will determine the nature of the problem and severity. An attempt to resolve the problem will be made by giving instructions to the customer. Any problem deemed mission critical will take top priority over all other calls.
- Telephone response within one hour of notification of the problem after 5:00 p.m., EST and during holidays that fall on a normal work day. During this initial response, support personnel will determine the nature of the problem and severity. An attempt to resolve the problem will be made by giving instructions to the customer.
- If this is unsuccessful or the severity too great, then Southern Software will escalate to a Level 2 response. A Level 2 response involves a support technician connecting remotely to the customer's network using industry standard secure remote diagnostic methods to attempt to resolve the problem.
- If the problem is unable to be detected or resolved with a Level 2 response then a technician
 will be scheduled for an on site visit. There is no cost to the customer for the on site visit as
 long as the problem is with a Southern Software product or equipment covered by a Southern
 Software support contract and as long as the problem is not due to a virus or negligent
 actions/treatment

The user understands support staff may provide a temporary fix. A permanent fix will be provided at a later date.

Program Updates

C. Proposed Geo-Comm Inc. Mapping Software Maintenance Contract

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Mr. Virginia will present a contract with Geo-Comm, Inc. for the mapping software maintenance contract. Geo-Comm, Inc. mapping allows for the E911 center to plot locations of individuals calling on cellular or land lines. The amount of the contract is \$9,625.

Board action is required to approve the contract in the amount of \$9,625 with Geo-Comm Inc. for mapping software.

Software Support Agreement

This Support Agreement' ("the Agreement") is made by and between **Watauga County Department** of Communications and Emergency Services ("the Customer"), organized under the laws of the state of North Carolina, and Geo-Comm, Inc ("GeoComm") a Minnesota corporation with its principal offices at 601 West St. Germain Street, St. Cloud, MN, 56301.

In this agreement the party who is contracting to receive the professional services shall be referred to as "the Customer," and the party who will be providing the services shall be referred to as "GeoComm."

GeoComm has an established background in communications engineering, geographic information systems development, cartography, software development and professional project management and is willing to provide those services to the Customer based on this background. The Customer desires to have services provided by GeoComm.

Therefore, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1 - Description of Service and Limitations of Exhibits

Beginning upon contract signing, GeoComm will provide the goods and services (collectively the Services) described in Exhibit A and attached and incorporated herein by reference, and shall be referred to as "the Exhibits." The Services are further explained in the Exhibits and include, without limitation, explanation concerning the following:

Software Support Services

Section 2 - Payment

The Customer shall pay a fee to GeoComm of **\$9,625.00** plus sales tax for services as described in the Exhibits provided under this agreement by GeoComm. The Customer agrees to pay GeoComm in full within forty-five (45) days of contract signing. Services under this agreement will be provided from **September 1, 2013 through August 31, 2014.**

Section 3 - Termination

Either party, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, may terminate this Agreement for violation of the material terms of this Agreement and failure to cure any deficiency within a reasonable time after notice thereof. In the event of termination for just cause by the Customer, GeoComm shall refund all amounts received to that point. In the event of termination for just cause by GeoComm, the Customer shall forfeit any funds paid and return any software and hardware received.

Section 4 - Relationship of Parties

The parties understand that GeoComm is an independent contractor and not an employee of the Customer.

Section 5 - Disclosure

GeoComm is required to disclose any outside activities or interests, including ownership or participation in the development of prior inventions, that conflict or may conflict with the best interests of the Customer. Prompt disclosure is required under this paragraph if the activity or interest is

related, directly or indirectly, to any activity that GeoComm may be involved with, on behalf of the Customer.

Section 6 - Employees

GeoComm's employees and agents, if any, who perform services for the Customer under this Agreement shall also be bound by the provisions of this agreement.

Section 7 - Injuries

GeoComm acknowledges its obligation to obtain appropriate insurance coverage for the benefit of GeoComm and its employees. GeoComm waives any rights to recover damages from the Customer for any injuries that GeoComm and/or its employees may sustain while performing services under this agreement and that are a result of the negligence of GeoComm or its employees or agents.

Section 8 - Indemnification

GeoComm agrees to indemnify and hold the Customer harmless from all claims, losses, expenses, fees including attorney fees, costs, and judgments that may be asserted against the Customer that result from the acts or omissions of GeoComm and/or its employees or agents.

Section 9 - Insurance

GeoComm shall obtain comprehensive general liability and workers compensation insurance for both personal injury and property damage with limits no less than those required under Customer State law. All policies shall not be cancelled, materially changed, or not renewed without thirty days prior notice thereof to the Customer. Minimum limits for GeoComm liability insurance shall be in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 for any number of claims arising out of a single occurrence under a single limit or combined limit or excess umbrella general liability insurance policy. GeoComm shall additionally obtain Worker's Compensation Insurance extending coverage to all its employees.

Section 10 - Data Confidentiality

GeoComm agrees to review, examine, inspect or obtain Customer data only for the purposes described in this agreement, and to at all times hold such information confidential. The obligation to protect the confidentiality of confidential information disclosed to the other party shall extend for a period of five (5) years following disclosure and shall survive early termination of this Agreement. All data, whether digital or hard-copy, provided to GeoComm by the Customer shall remain the legal property of the Customer, and shall not be distributed, sold or utilized by GeoComm for any purposes other than those defined in this contract, without the express permission of the Customer.

Section 11 - Nondiscrimination

During the performance of this Agreement, GeoComm agrees that no person shall, on the grounds of any status protected by law, be excluded from full employment rights in, participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any and all applicable federal and state laws against discrimination.

Section 12 - Assignment

GeoComm's obligations under this Agreement may not be assigned or transferred to any other person, firm, or corporation without the prior written consent of the Customer, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

Section 13 - Notices

All notices required or permitted under this agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed delivered in person or deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed as follows:

Section 14 - Entire Agreement

This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties and there are no other promises or conditions in any other agreement whether oral or written. This agreement supersedes any prior written or oral agreements between the parties.

Section 15 - Amendment

This Agreement may not be modified or amended unless the amendment is made in writing and is signed by both parties.

Section 16 - Ownership

It is agreed by and between the parties that all products created as a result of this contract will be the sole property of the Customer. With the exception of GeoComm's proprietary software products, all products created and delivered under this agreement may be used, altered and distributed at the Customer's discretion.

Section 17 - Severability

If any provision of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the remaining provisions shall continue to be valid and enforceable. If a court finds that any provision of this agreement is invalid or unenforceable, but that by limiting such provision it becomes valid and enforceable, then such provision shall be deemed to be written, construed, and enforced as so limited.

Section 18 - Laws to Be Observed

GeoComm shall keep fully informed of all Federal and state laws; all regulations pertaining to the Occupational and Safety Hazards Act (OSHA); all local laws, ordinances and regulations; and all orders and decrees of bodies and tribunals having any jurisdiction or authority, which in any manner affect the conduct of work.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Chairman Miller will present a resolution requesting the Board's consideration to name the Highway 421 Bridge over the South Fork of the New River in memory of Deputy Sheriff William Ronald Mast, Jr. The procedures for naming roads/bridges/ferries by NCDOT have been included in your packet for review. It is my understanding that the Board would need to adopt the resolution and then staff would submit background information on the nominee, description of what is requested to be named, and public input and support to NCDOT staff. NCDOT staff would review the information to ensure a previous facility has not been named and confirm that there is not any local opposition. After review the NCDOT staff will forward to the Road and Bridge Naming Committee and Board of Transportation for action. A Board member must endorse the request and present to the Committee and Board. A naming request reviewed and recommended by the Committee will be held for at least one month before being considered by the full Board.

In an effort to meet the public forum requirement by the NCDOT, staff would recommend the Board schedule a public hearing for the August 20, 2013 Board meeting. Upon completion of the public hearing the Board may adopt the resolution and forward to the NCDOT for consideration. Due to the fact that the bridge is located in the Town of Boone, the Boone Town Council would also need to adopt a resolution in a public forum in support of the naming of the bridge.

Should the Board wish to proceed; staff recommends the Board forward the attached resolution to the Town of Boone for support and adoption. In addition, the Board would need to schedule a public hearing for the August 20, 2013 Board meeting and then adopt the resolution as is or with changes.

PROCEDURES FOR NAMING ROADS/BRIDGES/FERRIES

The following documentation and information is required before any naming request will be considered by the Board of Transportation.

Information to be provided by the local nominating entity:

1. Background information on nominee. Sufficient information must be provided to explain why the naming is warranted; for example, local, state, and/or national contributions and accomplishments. If the designee is recently deceased, the request will be reviewed after a one year waiting period except for extenuating circumstances.

2. Description of what is requested to be named. The Board will consider naming Ferries, Interstate, US, and NC roads/bridges only, or more significant bridges on the state's secondary road system. The distance of road dedication should be approximately 5 miles or less. Law enforcement officers will be honored with bridge dedications in lieu of highways.

3. Resolutions from all local governing bodies associated with or affected by the request. City or town councils and/or county commissioners must adopt resolutions in a public forum and in sufficient detail to adequately justify the request. The road or bridge must be entirely within the boundaries of the requesting governing body or bodies.

4. Strong public input and support. Explain the degree to which the public supports the request and had notice of action with an opportunity for input.

5. Municipal officials and employees should be recognized with a municipally owned road or bridge in lieu of a state owned road or bridge except when there is a significant connection or association between the individual and a specific state owned road or bridge.

6. The requesting party shall reimburse the Department \$1,000 toward the costs of the signs. This represents approximately 50% of the sign cost.

NCDOT Staff Review:

7. Whether another facility has been previously named by the BOT. The Board does not name more than one facility for the same individual. Requests for duplicate family members reviewed on case by case basis.

8. If the facility is planned or under construction, expected completion date. The Board typically does not name facilities until approximately three months prior to completion.

9. Opposition. The Board does not mediate local disagreements. Requests must be a unanimous decision to be considered.

Action by the Road and Bridge Naming Committee and Board of Transportation:

- a. Board member must endorse request and present to Committee and Board.
- b. NCDOT Secretary and Board Chairman are Co-Chairs of the Committee and call meetings and approve the agenda.
- c. A naming request reviewed and recommended by the Committee will be "held" for at least one month before being considered by the full Board.

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION TO ASSIST WITH ROAD/BRIDGE NAMING REQUESTS FROM INDIVIDUALS AND GOVERNMENTS:

- The requesting party should have the family's support for the road or bridge naming request including agreement with the requested location of the dedication.
- The requested wording to appear on the actual signs needs to be stated in the resolution by the local government (with the family's concurrence) to insure the signs are manufactured correctly. Final wording is at the Department's discretion.
- Payment is due to the Department upon notification that the honorary designation has been approved by the Board. Signs will not be manufactured until payment is received.
- Local governments could consider the "Adopt a Highway" program as an alternative method of honoring an individual or group.
- The Board does not typically name a facility for accident victims. An individual's accomplishments and contributions to the state and community are used as criteria for consideration for a memorial designation.
- It is the responsibility of the individual seeking the road or bridge naming request to work directly with the local government to obtain the necessary resolution for submittal to the Board.
- Municipalities may name municipally owned streets or bridges in honor of individuals or groups. This does not require DOT review or approval.
- It is the Board's opinion that the Blue Star Memorial Highway designation honors all veterans and military groups in the state. Therefore, any other designation of a road or structure for veterans or military groups would be considered duplication.
- Honorary signs will be ground mounted; overhead signs will not be installed. Signs will be installed at the beginning and ending termini of the approved roadway segment, and will not be installed on exits, Y-lines, or intersecting roadways.
- Signs will not include titles except for certain designations as determined by the committee (i.e. Trooper, Congressman, Governor).
- Dedications for law enforcement officers are for North Carolina officers killed in the line of duty.
- Honorary designations will be roads/bridges and not structures or buildings.

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AGENDA ITEM 7:

PROPOSED REVISIONS TO THE WATAUGA COUNTY TOURISM DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (TDA) BYLAWS

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Mr. Wright Tilley, WCTDA Director, will review proposed changes to the Watauga County Tourism Development Authority bylaws. In order for the changes to be effective, the Board of Commissioners is required to approve. The Watauga County TDA has already approved the changes. The Article IV (F) was a typo and should have read Article V (F).

The Watauga County TDA board recently reviewed the TDA bylaws and is now proposing the attached revised bylaws for approval by the Watauga County Commissioners. These revised bylaws have been approved by the Watauga County TDA board, but they must be approved by a majority action by the County Commissioners.

The following is a summary of the proposed changes to the bylaws:

Article III – Section 1: Delete the wording regarding terms of inaugural board to include "Two members with terms expiring February 28, 2009, and two members with terms expiring February 28, 2008, and two members with terms expiring February 28, 2007."

Article III – Section 2a: Change wording to read, "Members shall serve terms of three years, with a limit of two consecutive terms. There must be a 2 year gap in service before re-appointment eligibility."

Note: The term limits and gap in service are new requirements.

Article III - Section 4: correct spelling error from "reminder" to "remainder."

Article III – Section 5: Remove the language regarding the County Manager, or his designee, serving as Secretary of the Authority.

Article IV (F): Amend language to read "To recommend tourism related capital expenditures."

Article VI - Section 1: Change ninety-six (96) hours to "forty-eight (48) hours."

WATAUGA COUNTY TOURISM DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BY LAWS

ARTICLE I. ESTABLISHMENT OF WATAUGA COUNTY TOURISM DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

The Watauga County Board of Commissioners for the purpose of advertising and promoting tourism in the County established the Watauga County Tourism Development Authority on December 5th, 2005.

ARTICLE II. OFFICE, BOOKS AND RECORDS

Section 1. Principal Office: Mailing Address

The principal office of the Authority shall be the Watauga County Administration Building, 814 West King Street, and its mailing address shall be Watauga County Tourism Development Authority, c/o County Manager's Office, 814 West King Street, Boone NC 28607.

Section 2. Books and Records

Except as may otherwise be provided by resolution of the Tourism Development Authority, or as may be required by the business of the Authority, all records of the Authority shall be kept at the principal office of the Authority. Financial records will be kept in the office of the Watauga County Finance Officer.

ARTICLE III. TOURISM DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Section 1. Appointment of Membership

The Authority shall consist of six (6) members appointed to three (3) year terms by the County Board of Commissioners, except for the initial appointees, whose terms shall be as follows:

Section 2. Tenure of Membership

- a. Members shall serve terms of three years, with a limit of two (2) consecutive terms. There must be a 2-year gap in service before re-appointment eligibility.
- b. Members desiring to resign should submit their resignation in writing to the Chairperson.
- c. Membership in the Authority is not transferable or assignable.

Section 3. Qualifications of Membership

- a. At least two (2) members of the Authority must be individuals who are affiliated with businesses that collect the occupancy tax levied by the Watauga County Board of Commissioners.
- b. At least three (3) members of the Authority must be individuals who are currently active in the promotion of travel and tourism in the Watauga County District U.

Deleted: Two members with terms expiring February 28, 2009, and two members with terms expiring February 28, 2008, and two members with terms expiring February 28, 2007.

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Section 4. Vacancies of Membership

The Watauga County Board of Commissioners shall fill vacancies occurring in the Authority for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Section 5. Officers

The County Board of Commissioners shall appoint a chairperson and the authority may choose a vice-chairperson if so desired. The Finance Officer of Watauga County shall serve ex officio as finance director for the Authority. This individual shall not be a member of the Authority and shall have no vote. The Chairman shall be the executive officer of the Authority, calling and presiding over all meetings, developing the agenda, and signing all bonds, contracts, checks and other instruments to be executed on behalf of the Authority.

Section 6. Compensation of Membership

No compensation shall be paid for services as members of the Authority.

ARTICLE IV. RULES AND CONDUCT

- (A) Faithful attendance at all meetings of the Authority and conscientious performance of the duties required of members of the Authority shall be considered a prerequisite of continuing membership on the Authority. If a member misses more than two (2) consecutive meetings, he/she may be replaced at the recommendation of the Authority, and at the discretion of the Watauga County Board of Commissioners.
- (B) No Authority member shall take part in the consideration and determination of any matter in which he/she has a direct personal or financial interest.
- (C) Each member shall maintain the confidential nature of confidential material which members may become privy to as a member of the Authority.
- (D) No Authority member shall directly or indirectly solicit any gift, or accept or receive any gift, whether in the form of money, services, loan, travel, entertainment, hospitality, thing or promise, or any other form, under circumstances in which a reasonable person would believe that the gift was intended to influence him/her in the performance of his/her duties, or was intended as a reward for any official action on his or her part.
- (E) The Authority may suspend or expel any of its appointed members for cause, and may terminate the membership of any of its appointed members by majority vote of its members and the approval of the Watauga County Board of Commissioners.

ARTICLE V. POWERS AND DUTIES

The Authority, upon its appointment shall study the tourism industry of the Watauga County District U and the most effective means of enhancing and promoting that industry and recommend any plans, actions and programs, which will, in accordance with the powers granted herein, serve to enhance and improve the tourism industry of the Watauga County District U. To this end, the Watauga County Board of Commissioners confers upon the Authority the following powers and duties:

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- (A) To promote travel, tourism, and corporate travel in the Watauga County District U, sponsor tourist-related events and activities in the district, and finance tourist related capital projects in the District;
- (B) To contract with and/or hire an individual, agency or organization to advertise or market an area or activity, publish and distribute pamphlets and other materials, conduct market research, and engage in or sponsor similar promotional activities that attract tourists or business travel to the area;
- (C) To make recommendations to the Watauga County Board of Commissioners for the efficient and effective enforcement of the Watauga County District U Room Occupancy and Tourism Development Tax;
- (D) To conduct such market research as it deems necessary in order to devise and develop the goals and plans necessary to create an effective marketing plan to promote the travel and tourism industry in the District;
- (E) To make tourism-related expenditures that, in the judgment of the Authority, are designed to increase the use of lodging facilities, recreational facilities, and business establishments in the District or to attract tourists or business travelers to the District;
- (F) To recommend tourism related capital expenditures,
- (G) To select appropriate goals for the enhancement and development of the tourism industry in the District;
- (H) To seek, evaluate, and choose proposals from appropriate organizations which will address the established and approved goals of the Authority;
- To evaluate the effective and efficient implementation of the officially adopted plans of the Authority and of the Watauga County Board of Commissioners;
- (J) To submit reports quarterly and at the close of the fiscal year, to the Watauga County Board of Commissioners regarding its receipts and expenditures for the preceding quarter and for the year in such detail as the Commissioners may require;
- (K) To make recommendations to the Watauga County Board of Commissioners regarding persons nominated to serve new terms or to fill vacant terms on the Watauga County District U Tourism Development Authority.

ARTICLE VI. MEETINGS

Section 1. Regular and Special Meetings

The Authority shall meet at least quarterly. The Chairperson may call special Meetings of the Authority at any time. At least forty-eight (48) hours written notice of the time and place of Special Meetings shall be given by the Secretary or by the Chairperson to each member of the Authority. All Authority meetings, with the exception of closed session, are to be open to the public and held in accordance with Article 33C of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, commonly referred to as the Open Meetings Law. The Secretary of the Authority shall keep a record of its members' attendance and the minutes of the Authority's meetings.

Section 2. Quorum

A quorum shall consist of four (4) members of the Authority.

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Deleted: including expenditures required to improve and increase the recreational facilities located in the District and maintain the attractiveness of the District and its green areas;

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Section 3. Voting

All actions taken by the Authority are done so by majority vote of the members of the Authority. Each member of the Authority is entitled to one vote. Votes may not be assigned. All members may vote on an issue properly before the Authority unless a member has a direct personal or financial interest in the matter before the Authority.

ARTICLE VII. FISCAL YEAR AND BUDGET

Section 1. Fiscal Year

The Fiscal Year for the Authority shall begin July 1 and end June 30. The Authority shall develop and approve a budget for each fiscal year in accordance with the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act.

Section 2. Expenditures

The Authority shall use at least two-thirds of the funds remitted to it by the Watauga County Board of Commissioners to promote travel and tourism in the Watauga County District U and shall use the remainder of the funds remitted to it for tourism-related expenditures.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

Except as otherwise provided by law, these By Laws, or any part thereof, may be amended, added to, altered or repealed at the pleasure of and by a majority affirmative vote of the members of the Authority and with the approval of the Watauga County Board of Commissioners.

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

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Mr. Furman will present a performance guarantee for Capstone Collegiate Communities in the form of cash to cover the remaining paving and plantings. Pending Planning Board approval on July 15th, Commissioners' approval is requested as set forth in Section 92 of the ordinance.

Board action is requested to approve the subdivision performance guarantee as presented.

SECTION 92. Deferment of Improvements.

Where it is in the best interest of all parties concerned to defer the installation or completion of some required improvement, the Planning Board may approve the final plat if the subdivider posts a bond with surety or other guarantees satisfactory to the County Commissioners in an amount equal to the estimated cost of the deferred improvements plus twenty (20) percent. Such guarantees shall assure either the performance of the specified work or payment of the specified sum to the County if such improvements have not been installed within the time specified on the final plat. At least fifty percent (50%) of the required improvements shall be completed prior to submission of a request for approval of a performance guarantee by a subdivider.

B. Proposed McGill Associates Supplemental Agreement

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Mr. Furman will request Board approval of the attached supplemental agreement with McGill Associates in the amount of \$17,000 to complete the engineering, permitting, and bid preparation for the US Highway 421 Greenway Underpass Project. The work is required to design and acquire a Letter of Map Amendment from FEMA and subsequent permitting from the Town of Boone. NCDOT has waived the competitive bidding process for this service. In addition, FEMA will charge \$10,000 for submission of the Map Amendment. All of these expenses are eligible for reimbursement under the greenway agreement funding with NCDOT. This work is required to be completed in order for the project to reach the bidding stage.

Board action is required to approve the supplemental agreement with McGill Associates in the amount of \$17,000 and the \$10,000 submission fee for FEMA.

The due diligence work by McGill Associates will be completed and available prior to the hearing.

GS_158-7.1

§ 158-7.1. Local development.

(a) Each county and city in this State is authorized to make appropriations for the purposes of aiding and encouraging the location of manufacturing enterprises, making industrial surveys and locating industrial and commercial plants in or near such city or in the county; encouraging the building of railroads or other purposes which, in the discretion of the governing body of the city or of the county commissioners of the county, will increase the population, taxable property, agricultural industries and business prospects of any city or county. These appropriations may be funded by the levy of property taxes pursuant to G.S. 153A–149 and 160A–209 and by the allocation of other revenues whose use is not otherwise restricted by law.

(b) A county or city may undertake the following specific economic development activities. (This listing is not intended to limit by implication or otherwise the grant of authority set out in subsection (a) of this section). The activities listed in this subsection may be funded by the levy of property taxes pursuant to G.S. 153A–149 and G.S. 160A–209 and by the allocation of other revenues whose use is not otherwise restricted by law.

- (1) A county or city may acquire and develop land for an industrial park, to be used for manufacturing, assembly, fabrication, processing, warehousing, research and development, office use, or similar industrial or commercial purposes. A county may acquire land anywhere in the county, including inside of cities, for an industrial park, while a city may acquire land anywhere in the county or counties in which it is located. A county or city may develop the land by installing utilities, drainage facilities, street and transportation facilities, street lighting, and similar facilities; may demolish or rehabilitate existing structures; and may prepare the site for industrial or commercial uses. A county or city may convey property located in an industrial park pursuant to subsection (d) of this section.
- (2) A county or city may acquire, assemble, and hold for resale property that is suitable for industrial or commercial use. A county may acquire such property anywhere in the county, including inside of cities, while a city may acquire such property inside the city or, if the property will be used by a business that will provide jobs to city residents, anywhere in the county or counties in which it is located. A county or city may convey property acquired or assembled under this subdivision pursuant to subsection (d) of this section.
- (3) A county or city may acquire options for the acquisition of property that is suitable for industrial or commercial use. The county or city may assign such an option, following such procedures, for such consideration, and subject to such terms and conditions as the county or city deems desirable.
- (4) A county or city may acquire, construct, convey, or lease a building suitable for industrial or commercial use.
- (5) A county or city may construct, extend or own utility facilities or may provide for or assist in the extension of utility services to be furnished to an industrial facility, whether the utility is publicly or privately owned.
- (6) A county or city may extend or may provide for or assist in the extension of water and sewer lines to industrial properties or facilities, whether the industrial property or facility is publicly or privately owned.
- (7) A county or city may engage in site preparation for industrial properties or facilities, whether the industrial property or facility is publicly or privately owned.

(c) Any appropriation or expenditure pursuant to subsection (b) of this section must be approved by the county or city governing body after a public hearing. The county or city shall publish notice of the public hearing at least 10 days before the hearing is held. If the appropriation or expenditure is for the acquisition of an interest in real property, the notice shall describe the interest to be acquired, the proposed acquisition cost of such interest, the governing body's intention to approve the acquisition, the source of funding for the acquisition and such other information needed to reasonably describe the acquisition. If the appropriation or expenditure is for the improvement of privately owned property by site preparation or by the extension of water and sewer lines to the property, the notice shall describe the improvements to be made, the proposed cost of making the improvements, the source of funding for the improvements, the public benefit to be derived from making the improvements, and any other information needed to reasonably describe the improvements and their purpose.

(d) A county or city may lease or convey interests in real property held or acquired pursuant to subsection (b) of this section in accordance with the procedures of this subsection. A county or city may convey or lease interests in property by private negotiation and may subject the property to such covenants, conditions, and restrictions as the county or city deems to be in the public interest or necessary to carry out the purposes of this section. Any such conveyance or lease must be approved by the county or city governing body, after a public hearing. The county or city shall publish notice of the public hearing at least 10 days before the hearing is held; the notice shall describe the interest to be conveyed or leased, the value of the interest, the proposed consideration for the conveyance or lease, and the governing body's intention to approve the conveyance or lease. Before such an interest may be conveyed, the county or city governing body shall determine the probable average hourly wage to be paid to workers by the business to be located at the property to be conveyed and the fair market value of the interest, conditions, and restrictions the county or city proposes to subject it to. The consideration for the conveyance may not be less than the value so determined.

(d1) Repealed by Session Laws 1993, c. 497, s. 22.

(d2) In arriving at the amount of consideration that it receives, the Board may take into account prospective tax revenues from improvements to be constructed on the property, prospective sales tax revenues to be generated in the area, as well as any other prospective tax revenues or income coming to the county or city over the next 10 years as a result of the conveyance or lease provided the following conditions are met:

- (1) The governing board of the county or city shall determine that the conveyance of the property will stimulate the local economy, promote business, and result in the creation of a substantial number of jobs in the county or city that pay at or above the median average wage in the county or, for a city, in the county where the city is located. A city that spans more than one county is considered to be located in the county where the greatest population of the city resides. For the purpose of this subdivision, the median average wage in a county is the median average wage for all insured industries in the county as computed by the Department of Commerce, Division of Employment Security, for the most recent period for which data is available.
- (2) The governing board of the county or city shall contractually bind the purchaser of the property to construct, within a specified period of time not to exceed five years, improvements on the property that will generate the tax revenue taken into account in arriving at the consideration. Upon failure to construct the improvements specified in the contract, the purchaser shall reconvey the property back to the county or city.

(e) All appropriations and expenditures pursuant to subsections (b) and (c) of this section shall be subject to the provisions of the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Acts of the North Carolina General Statutes, respectively, for cities and counties and shall be listed in the annual financial report the county or city submits to the Local Government Commission. The budget format for each such governing body shall make such disclosures in such detail as the Local Government Commission may by rule and regulation direct.

(f) At the end of each fiscal year, the total of the following for each county and city may not exceed one-half of one percent (0.5%) of the outstanding assessed property tax valuation for the county or city as of January 1 preceding the beginning of the fiscal year:

(1) The investment in property acquired at any time under subdivisions (b)(1) through (b)(4) of this section and owned at the end of the fiscal year.

- (2) The amount expended during the fiscal year under subdivisions (b)(5) and (b)(7) of this section.
- (3) The amount of tax revenue that was taken into account under subsection (d2) of this section and was expected to be received during the fiscal year.

The Local Government Commission shall review the annual financial reports filed by counties and cities to determine if any county or city has exceeded the limit set by this subsection. If the Commission finds that a county or city has exceeded this limit, it shall notify the county or city. A county or city that receives a notice from the Commission under this subsection must submit to the Commission for its review and approval any appropriation or expenditure the county or city proposes to make under this section during the next three fiscal years. The Commission shall not approve an appropriation or expenditure that would cause a county or city to exceed the limit set by this subsection.

(h) Each economic development agreement entered into between a private enterprise and a city or county shall clearly state their respective responsibilities under the agreement. Each agreement shall contain provisions regarding remedies for a breach of those responsibilities on the part of the private enterprise. These provisions shall include a provision requiring the recapture of sums appropriated or expended by the city or county upon the occurrence of events specified in the agreement. Events that would require the city or county to recapture funds would include the creation of fewer jobs than specified in the agreement, a lower capital investment than specified in the agreement. B. Mutual Aid Agreement Renewal with Watauga County Emergency and Rescue Squad, Inc.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

The County's Mutual Aid Agreement between Watauga County and Watauga County Emergency and Rescue Squad, Inc., has expired. Staff has modified the agreement to allow for the automatic renewal of the contract unless either party gives a thirty (30) day notice.

Staff requests the Board approve the contract as presented, including the automatic renewal language.

Rescue Protection and Mutual Aid Agreement Between The County Of Watauga and Watauga County Emergency and Rescue Squad, Inc.

This Agreement made and entered into as of July 1, 2013, by and between Watauga County Emergency and Rescue Squad, Inc. – a voluntary non-profit association, hereinafter referred to as WCRS and the COUNTY OF WATAUGA, a body politic and corporate of the State of North Carolina, hereinafter referred to as the County.

Agreed upon by the parties hereto, together with the mutual covenants hereinafter set forth, agree as follows:

- 1. Watauga County Emergency and Rescue Squad, Inc. shall provide rescue services in their respective response district to the citizens of Watauga County as agreed upon by the parties hereto. This agreement shall commence once effective July 1, 2013, for two (2) years and may be terminated by one or both of the parties hereto in accordance with Section 6 of this agreement.
- 2. Watauga County Emergency and Rescue Squad, Inc., agrees to develop a budget and submit an audit in accordance with the guidelines set forth by Watauga County Commissioners.
- 3. This agreement shall be automatically renewed for successive one-year terms, unless canceled by either party by written notice of such cancellation to the other party at least thirty (30) days prior to the end of any renewal period and in accordance with Section Six (6) of this contract. The amount of compensation shall be determined by mutual consent of the parties on an annual basis consistent with the terms of Section 2 of this agreement.
- 4. WCRS understands and agrees that by entering into this agreement and providing rescue services, it is acting as an independent contractor, neither WCRS nor its employees, members or personnel shall be deemed or construed to be employees of the County. WCRS shall at all times carry liability insurance on its employees, members or personnel, and equipment relieving the County from any responsibility for damages or claims arising from the activities of its employees, members and personnel, or from the operation of its equipment. The County shall be named as an additional insured on all liability policies and WCRS shall furnish a Certificate of Insurance to the County annually and at any other time requested by the County.
- 5. WCRS agrees that it will indemnify and save the County harmless from any and all claims, suits, losses, damages, costs or other expenses.
- 6. Each party shall have the right to terminate this agreement without cause by giving the other party thirty (30) days written notice of termination, prior to the end of the contract period. In the event of termination, WCRS shall provide the County with a financial accounting, as required by the County, for all funds received by the WCRS and on-hand up to the date of termination. Either party shall have the right to terminate the agreement for cause in the event the other party materially breaches the terms of this Agreement.

- 7. The parties agree that this agreement is not transferable or assignable by either party without the written consent of the parties to the agreement.
- 8. This agreement constitutes the entire understanding of the parties and contains all the terms agreed upon with reference to the subject matter hereto. No modification or revision of this agreement shall be effective unless evidenced by a written document signed by both parties to this agreement.
- 9. In time of need, WCRS agrees to provide automatic and mutual aid to other Fire and Rescue Districts in the County upon request. Provided, however, this automatic and mutual aid is shall not unduly jeopardize the safety of the citizens within the WCRS's response district as determined by the Chief Officer or his designee.
- 10. WCRS agrees to provide rescue services for the County excluding the Blowing Rock Rescue district, which provides its own rescue services. WCRS shall be sole provider for rescue services for the County that is commensurate with rescue guidelines as set forth by the State of North Carolina for heavy rescue service standards. In the event the County wishes another agency to provide such services, notification shall be made to WCRS stating that they can provide equal services. The County shall then discuss the service and coverage with WCRS to ensure the same coverage would be provided.
- 11. Watauga County Emergency and Rescue Squad, Inc. is a volunteer agency. In the event the County wishes to have full time coverage, then compensation should be commensurate with coverage for example, if the County wants to guarantee coverage for 8, 12, or 24 hours or any combination, compensation would need to take place in order to cover those individuals working. Currently, all staff of WCRS are volunteers and respond as they can enabling them to cover all calls as they happen.

I do not live in the ETJ, but would like to be considered if you do not have enough qualified applicants that reside in this zone as I live very close to it. I beleive you reached an agreement with the Town that you would give residents of the ETJ fist priority.

I feel that I am qualified for membership in this organization as I worked as the defacto planner and the Zoning Administrator for the Town of Blowing Rock for five years. It would certainly not take me very long to catch up on any legal changes that have been made.

As some of you may remember, my request to be appointed to this Board instigated the previous controversy between the County and the Town concerning appointments to ETJ Boards. 

MADE IN AMERICA: GROUP DECISIONS BY DESIGN

The most important decisions in local government are made by county commissions and city councils. Compared to individual decision-making, group decision-making has the potential to generate far superior solutions. When group decision-making goes bady, though, the outcomes tend to be even worse than the worst decisions individuals make.

Recognized internationally for his research, executive programs and consulting on group decision-making, Keith Allred will lead this fun and interactive LELA Pre-Conference Seminar that will give participants the skills and insights needed to realize the benefits and avoid the pitfalls of group decision-making.

The discussion is grounded in two sources of wisdom on group decision-making. First, the vision the founders had for American selfgovernment and their belief that broad and diverse support is the best indicator of wise policies are discussed. Having built the structure of separation of powers on this foundational principle, understanding the founders' views provides fundamental insights into effective group decisionmaking. Second, modern research has identified which kinds of group processes generate good decisions and which generate poor ones.

The lessons of both the founder's vision and research for group decision-making are then applied by comparing two Kennedy Administration cases. First, the reasons for the disastrous decision regarding the Bay of Pigs are discussed drawing on the Harvard case study. Second, the reasons the same group made a remarkably effective decision just 18 months later in the Cuban Missile Crisis are explored drawing on excerpts from the movie "13 Days" that are based on transcripts from Kennedy's secret taping system.

LOCAL ELECTED LEADERS By attending the NCACC Annual Conference, county commissioners receive nine credits toward recognition for their commitment to lifelong learning through the Local Elected Leaders Academy (LELA) Recognition Program. Through LELA, the NCACC and School of Government have established for individual county commissioners a three-level recognition program that will help the Association achieve one of its strategic goals, "strengthen county leadership and board development." In addition, Pre-Conference Seminar attendees will receive six workshop credits.


